*The Marine Corps has 24 active duty installations with more than 12,000 buildings, residing on more than 2.3 million acres. We spend approximately \$4 billion annually in operations, sustainment and new construction on these installations that have a replacement value of more than \$57 billion.*

...And together – the resources of MCICOM working with you – we will find ways to gain efficiencies on these installations without jeopardizing the Corps readiness. Significantly reduced budgets for base operations drive changes that need to be made now to ensure we maintain the highest degree of operational and installation readiness.

## YOUR INVOLVEMENT IS ESSENTIAL

Early identification of requirements will lead to the right facilities support at the right place and time. Major changes are underway — from weapons platforms to end strength, to Marine unit beddown locations — so understanding requirements early allows for environmental analysis and Military Construction projects to be completed on pace with warfighter transformations.
